Data Collection

- Data Collection Period: 2 Feb 2023 – 26 Mar 2023
- Response rate:
 - 192 total responses, 177 included in analysis
 - 15 records removed - respondents indicated the country where they live/work, and their role(s) but did not answer any other survey questions

Western and Central Europe and North America (n=104)

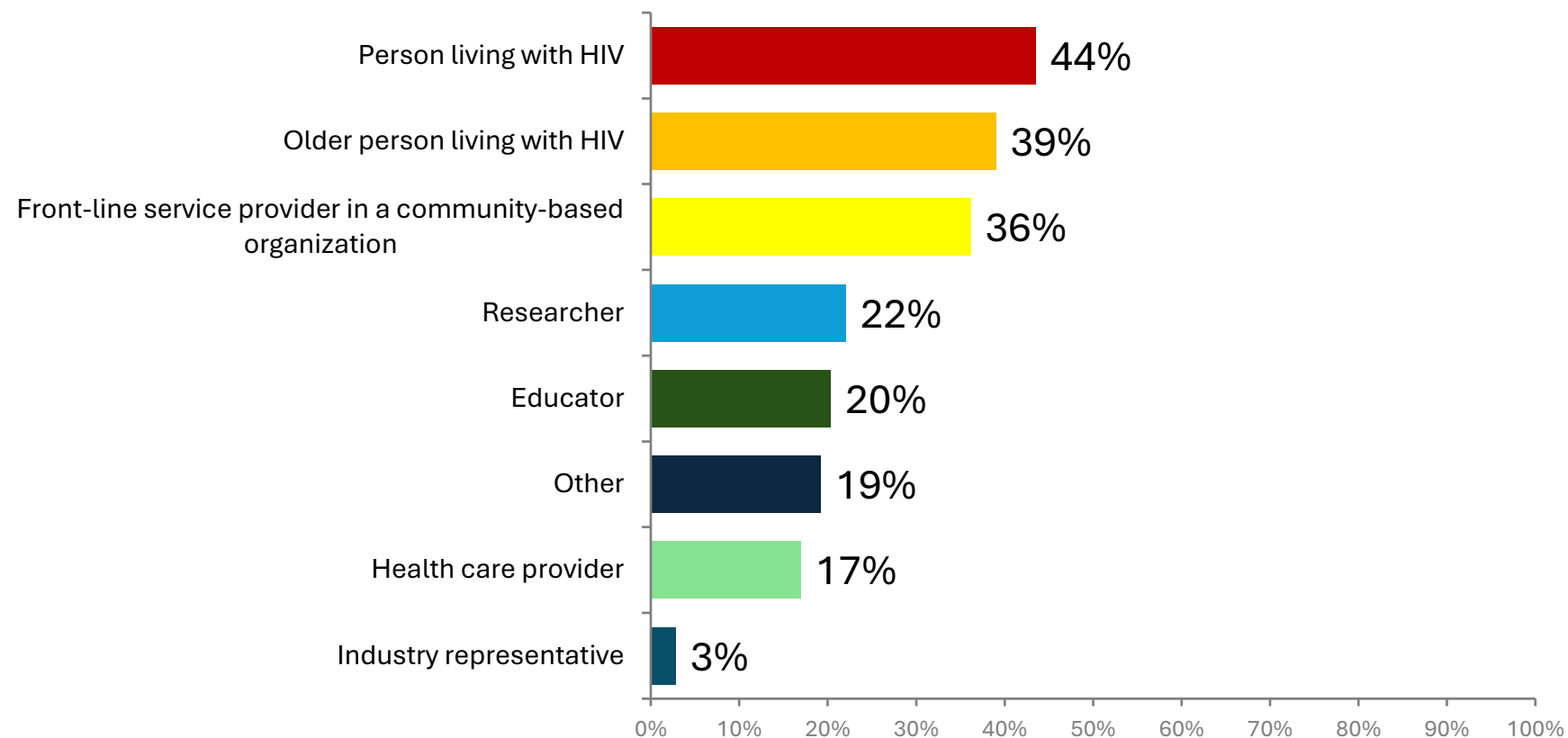

Q2: Which of the following best describes your role? (Choose all that apply.)

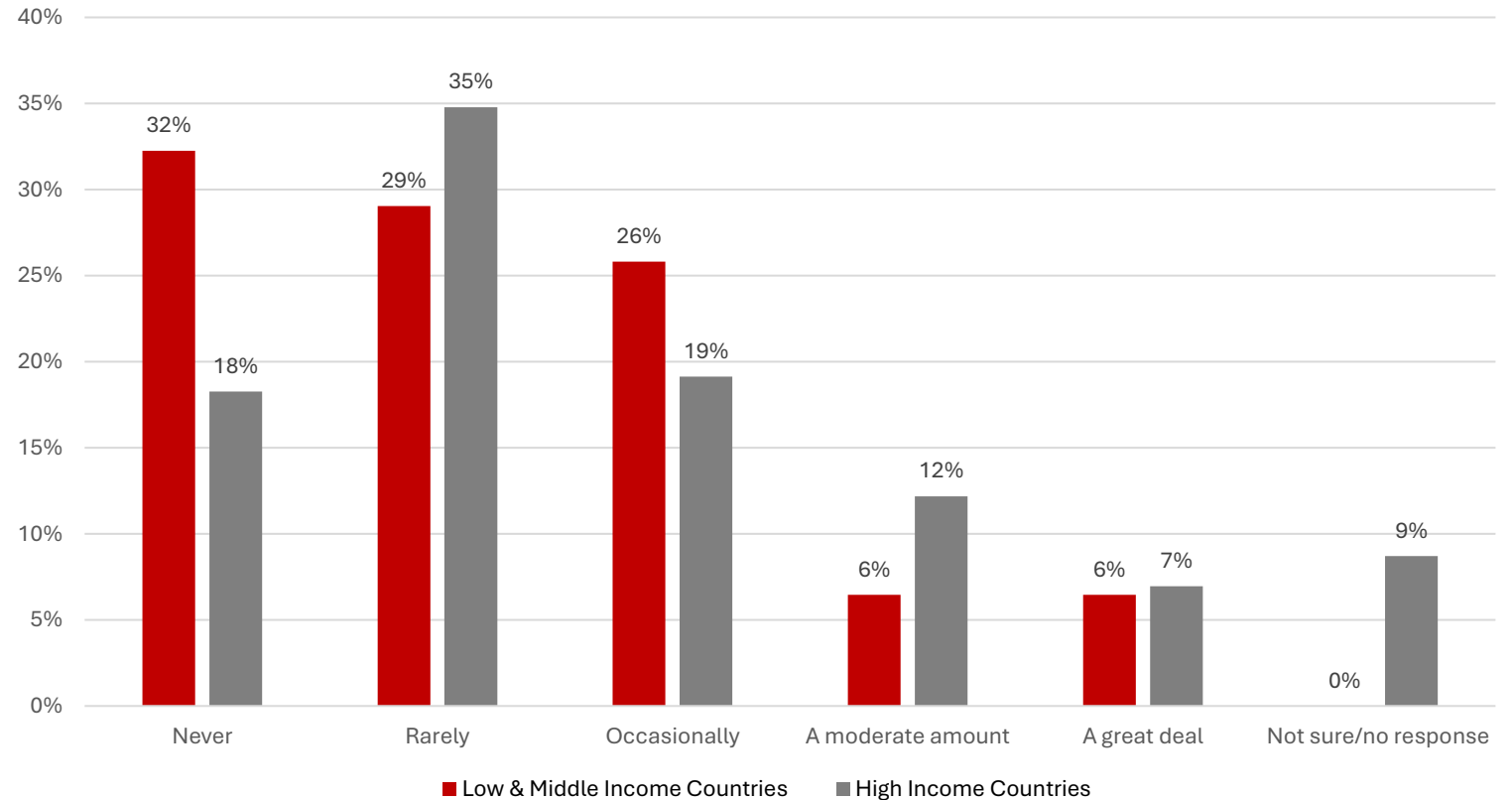

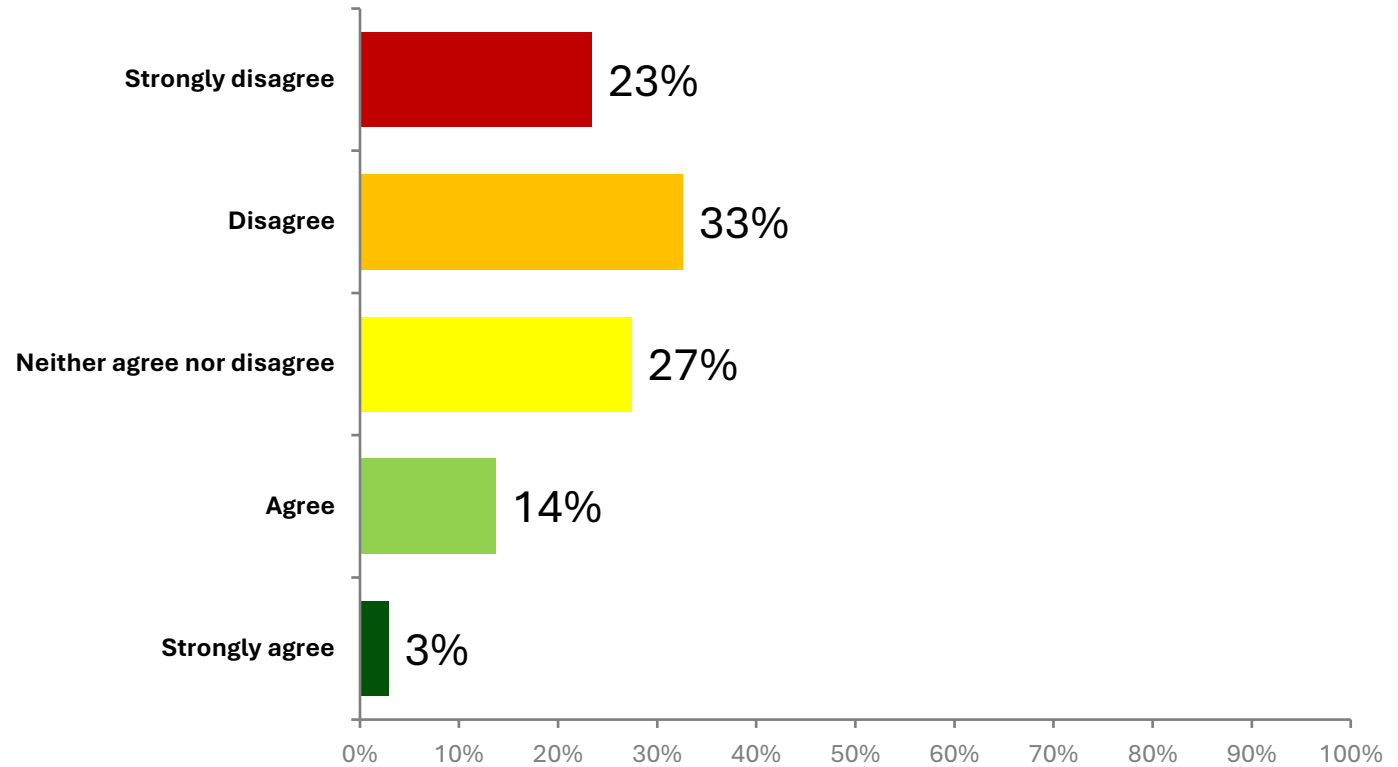
Are the unmet needs of older people living with HIV being discussed where you live?

By Decision- and Policy-Makers



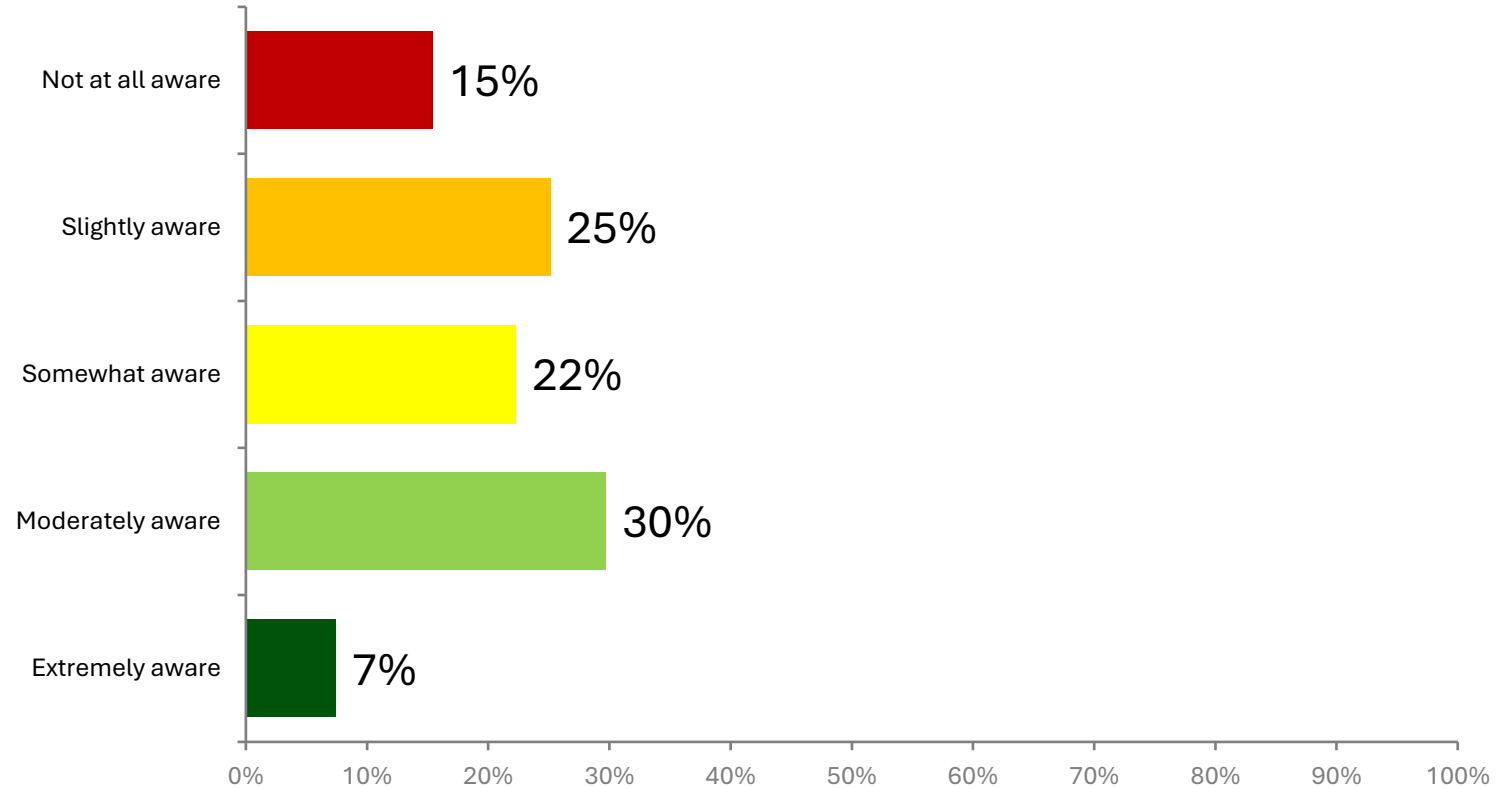


Q4: The health and psychosocial needs of older people living with HIV are being met where I live.





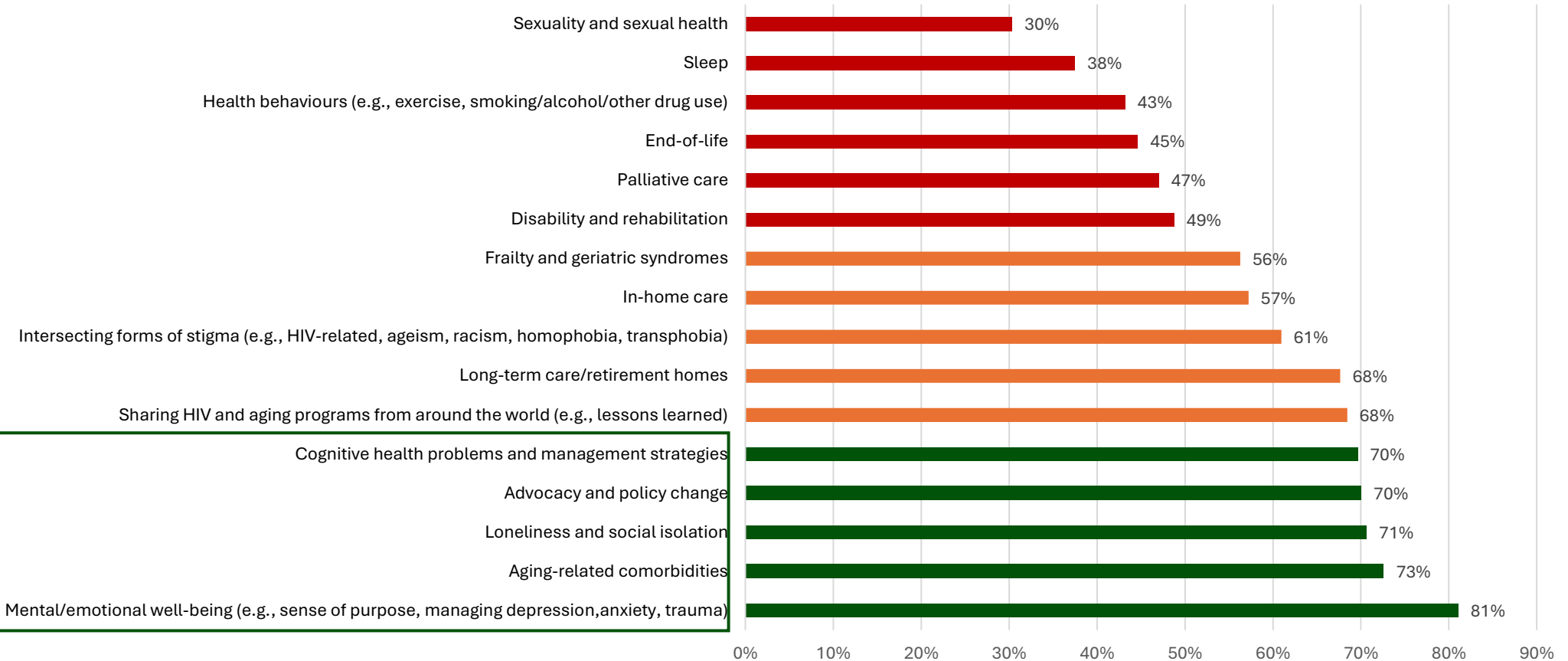

Q8: With regard to your need for information/ learning/education, rate each of the following topics as high, moderate or low priority

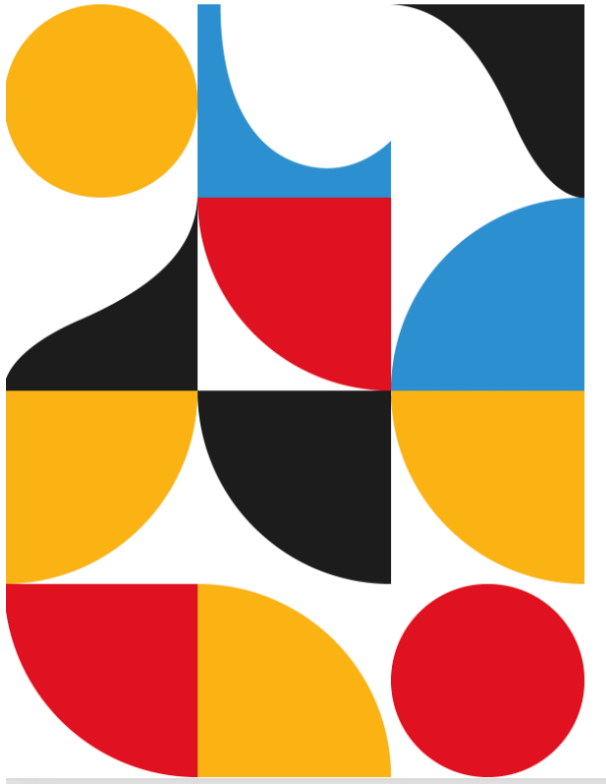
Proportion of Respondents Rating Topic as High Priority
